We know that we have more to do. Our strength as an institution is our ability to look inward as well as outward, to acknowledge the past and embrace opportunities for a brighter future. We persistently renew our understanding of equity and do the hard work to make an inclusive, safe and inspiring environment for every member of our community.

## BMCC/PAC-NYC Alliance Yields Inspiring Student Performances

tudents at Borough of Manhattan Community College (BMCC/CUNY) thrive in opportunities made possible through partnerships BMCC has forged across New York City and in neighboring lower Manhattan. Students intent on careers in areas such as business and the arts complete internships and mentored projects in the nearby Financial District, historic Trinity Church Wall Street, the National September 11 Memorial & Museum, Hudson River Park and more.

Most recently, talented BMCC students have claimed their place in a series of world-class musical performances at the recently opened Ronald O. Perelman Performing Arts Center (PAC-NYC). The series, known as BMCC Live at PAC-NYC, is led by the College's Music program and involves Music majors as well as students and faculty



from the Speech, Communication and Theatre department.

On September 27, BMCC Live at PAC-NYC kicked off a debut produced by BMCC Music Professor Quentin Angus that featured about 20 students. Commuters, curious tourists and passers-by were treated to the sound of jazz, indie music and bluegrass as it wafted out from the PAC-NYC's Vartan and Clare Gregorian stage. A full house gathered in PAC-NYC's architecturally acclaimed structure, which is shaped like a marble cube and is located at the foot of the World Trade Center, just steps from BMCC's Fiterman Hall.

In October, a well-received monologue slam produced by BMCC Theatre Professor **Angela Polite** took the stage, and by the time this publication goes to press, more performances starring BMCC students will have been presented, with plans underway for 2024.

"The performance series BMCC Live at PAC-NYC is one component of an

exciting civic alliance and partnership between BMCC and PAC-NYC," said BMCC Speech, Communications and Theatre department Chair Vincent Tzu-Wen Cheng. "We are all excited about this alliance and the opportunities it will make possible for BMCC students, staff and faculty."

As he welcomed another full house audience to the October monologue slam, Cheng thanked PAC-NYC for making the space "available, approachable and accessible for our students, faculty and staff, and for opening another door for us to interact with our lower Manhattan community members."

In a press release announcing PAC-NYC's alliances with BMCC and other lower Manhattan community organizations, PAC-NYC Artistic Director Bill Rauch said, "These partnerships will invite and include our neighbors from all five boroughs, connect people across differences and help us discover how art can continue to inspire and heal."

## STEM Innovation Challenge Focuses on Social Good at BMCC

n November 4, the NSF-funded project, "Bridging the Gap: BMCC Technology Learning Community" hosted a "STEM Innovation Challenge for Social Good" event in Richard Harris Terrace. Over 100 people attended the event, including 65 students who formed 16 teams, as well as faculty, volunteers and industry mentors from Google, Meta, the NYC Department of Planning, the United Nations, Axon, the MTA, BetaNYC, Spectrum, AWS and CITE. The student teams brainstormed to create innovative solutions using technology and addressing topics such as diversity in STEM careers, student housing resources and other areas deemed as relating to the social good at BMCC.

# BMCC Leads Partnership to Address Dire Shortage of Early Childhood Special Education Teachers

he U.S. Department of **Education awarded BMCC** a two-year, \$200,000 grant to lead an Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) partnership with CUNY's Brooklyn College, Bronx Community College. Hostos Community College, Kingsborough Community College and LaGuardia Community College, as well as the Kennedy Children's Center (KCC). Together, they will develop ECSE associate degree programs and more, addressing a dire shortage of early childhood special education teachers. BMCC Teacher Education Professor Jennifer Longley is principal investigator (PI) with three co-PIs: BMCC Early **Childhood Education Program** Coordinator Jennifer Gilken, Brooklyn College Early Childhood Education/Art Education Department Chair Jacqueline Shannon, and KCC Executive Director Jeanne Alter.

## **BMCC Named Eligible for 2025 Aspen Prize**

elected from a pool of 1,000 colleges across the country, BMCC has been named by the Aspen Institute as one of the 150 community colleges eligible to compete for the \$1 million Aspen Prize for Community College Excellence, the nation's signature recognition of achievement among community colleges. The \$1 million Aspen Prize is awarded every two years. In 2021, BMCC was named as one of the Aspen Award's Top Ten finalists.



## Art Major Wins \$62K Scholarship to Holyoke

rt Foundations/Art History 2023 alumna Johanna Graedler has been awarded a \$62,000 scholarship through the Frances Perkins Program at Mount Holyoke College in South Hadley, Massachusetts. "I couldn't have gotten this far without the support of my Art Professors Maya Jiménez and Yan Yang, as well as my parents," says Graedler. "I also owe a lot to the Transfer Scholars Network program at BMCC. They set up zoom meetings with admissions officers and helped me send applications to more than a dozen colleges." She explains that having grown up in Germany, advanced degrees were never an option. "We have three types of high schools there, and only the top tier schools make you eligible to apply



to college. They sort you in elementary school, and when I was in 4<sup>th</sup> grade, the head teacher made the call and put me in line for the mid-level high school, not the top one." After graduation, she says,

"My only option was to consider vocational training, such as preparing to work in a grocery store, but I wanted to go to college and study art history." In 2018, Graedler made a trip by herself to New York City. "I was 19 about to turn 20. I stayed at a really shoddy Air B&B in Hell's Kitchen. While I was there, I went to an open house at BMCC, Hunter and Baruch." Graedler returned to Germany and learned English, she says, through movies and podcasts like NPR. She started classes remotely at BMCC in Fall 2020 and completed her associate degree online. Her parents, who were dubious of her plans at first, have second-mortgaged their home to help with her living expenses as she attends Holyoke, one of the top liberal arts schools in the country. "I am so grateful to my parents, my professors, the staff at TSN and the Frances Perkins Program at Holyoke for believing in me," Graedler says.

## BMCC President Munroe and SUNY Empire University President Vollendorf Sign Academic Transfer Agreement



n October 26, BMCC
President Anthony E. Munroe and SUNY Empire State
University President Lisa Vollendorf signed a memo of understanding and transfer agreement for the BMCC/SUNY Empire University Pathways Transfer program. BMCC graduates in Business, Paramedic and other majors can transfer to a bachelor's degree program at SUNY Empire that blends online, independent and in-person studies. On December 7, President Munroe and University of Turin Rector Stefano Guena signed

a Statement of Shared Interest linking BMCC with the University of Turin, a public research university with around 80,000 students in Turin, Italy. On January 8, President Munroe and University of Albany President Havidán Rodríguez signed a partnership agreement that will enable BMCC graduates to seamlessly transfer to a bachelor's degree program at UAlbany. These agreements add to more than a dozen umbrella partnerships and over 50 articulation agreements that BMCC provides.

# Washington Market Park Basketball Courts Refurbished

n September 8, a ribboncutting ceremony opened the newly refurbished Washington Market Park Basketball Courts next to the BMCC campus at 199 Chambers Street. # A Work-Study Student and English Adjunct Evolve Into College Leaders and Guide BMCC's Growth Over Decades



B MCC was founded in 1963, and on this 60-Year Anniversary, members of the College community are sharing their memories and contributions to BMCC's growth. In 1978, Marva Craig entered BMCC as a Liberal Arts major and work-study employee in the College's midtown location. In 1984, a year after BMCC

had moved to its 199 Chambers Street campus in lower Manhattan, Erwin Wong joined BMCC as an adjunct in the English Department. Now Vice President of Student Affairs Marva Craig and Provost/Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs Erwin Wong head up departments of the College that ensure both the

intellectual and personal growth of students. Together, serving students with academic opportunities and degree offerings, as well as services and activities, they have helped guide BMCC's growth from a few hundred students in 1963 to close to 17,500 today, and from a handful of degree programs to more than 60, and counting.

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
